The year was 69 C.E. (Common Era). The temple that was built and rebuilt to the glory of God in Jerusalem was destroyed permanently. The temple had been desecrated many times during its history. Solomon—the son of the mighty king David—built the first temple in 960 B.C.E. (Before Common Era), and it lasted until it was destroyed by the Babylonians in 586 B.C.E., at which time the people of Israel were taken into captivity as exiles.

The people began to rebuild the temple in 536 B.C.E, but it took them 20 years to complete the work. The books Ezra and Nehemiah in the Hebrew Scriptures tell of this work. This temple is referred to in history as Zerubbabel's Temple.

In 20 B.C.E., Herod--the governor that Caesar Augustus placed in power over Jerusalem—began a temple expansion project. He continued to expand the temple of the people of Israel from 20 B.C.E. until 64 C.E., which means that the temple was being enlarged by the Roman Government during the lifetime of Jesus...and beyond.

But in 69 C.E., the temple was permanently destroyed. Because the people no longer had a place to worship God together, home became the place where Jewish people worshipped God. New rites and observances became a part of holiday celebrations. Every family now had the power to make a temple for the Living God of their own home and hearth.

The year was 2019 C.E., and the month was December. Doctors in China were treating a mysterious type of pneumonia that had never been seen before. By January 2020 C.E., the first deaths caused by this new virus—COVID 19—were recorded. Our "temple" was not physically destroyed during the months and years that followed, but still...we no longer had a place to worship God together, and we too began to worship God at home. Each of us were presented with the opportunity to make a temple for the Living God of our own home and hearth.

Our rituals and our holiday celebrations change because of many things...age, decreased mobility and strength, mental health, family connections or disconnections...and even illnesses like COVID. We are no longer in worldwide pandemic status, but that does not mean that we are going back to our old patterns and rituals either. We warmly invite you to celebrate the holidays with us this month if you are able, but if you are not, don't forget to make of your own home and hearth a temple to the Living God. More on how you might do that can be found in this newsletter.

OTHER DAYS OF HOLY CELEBRATION IN DECEMBER

Saint Nicholas Day—December 6th



Saint Nicholas was an actual bishop in the 4 th Century C.E. who served the church in Turkey. He wore the red robes of a bishop, and he was said to have great love for children and for the poor. Nicholas often did deeds of charity in the dark of night, leaving food and money for poor families. It was said that he would fling gold coins through open windows and that they would land in the shoes of the poor. After Nicholas died,

stories of his generosity spread throughout Europe, and people began to wear red clothes as he did and to leave anonymous gifts of food and money for people in need.

Celebrate Saint Nicholas by anonymously giving to those who are in need (Whether you wear red when you do is up to you.)

Saint Lucia Day—December 13th



Saint Lucia lived in Sicily around the year 300 C.E. She was martyred by the Romans because of her Christian faith. When the Vikings invaded Sicily, they heard of her story, and they took it back to their Scandinavian homes. The name Lucia means light. At the darkest time of the year (near the Winter Solstice) the Scandinavian people use her story and her name to symbolize the coming of the light of Christ into the world.

In celebrating Saint Lucia Day, the oldest girl in the family arises before sunrise; she puts on a white gown (symbolizing purity) with a red sash (symbolizing martyrdom) and she wakes up the rest of the household by bringing sweet rolls and coffee to them. The girl that was doing the serving as Lucia was also to wear a wreath of green leaves and lighted candles on her head. If you do decide to replicate the attire of Lucia, please use battery-operated candles instead of actual flame. (We have made this adjustment for our Christmas Trees...we can make it for our daughter's heads too!)

Thanking God for the Light of Christ in the world, while having a breakfast of sweet rolls and coffee in bed sounds like a good way to celebrate every morning to me...not just a holiday morning in December.
